He is the Research Leader for the Religion and Globalisation Cluster at ARI and Director of the Wan Boo Sow Research Centre for Chinese Culture. His recent publications include several volumes on Chinese epigraphy collected in Fujian and Singapore, surveys of ritual activities in Putian villages, and historical and ethnographic studies of Taoism, popular religion and sectarian religious movements in Fujian. He directed *Bored in Heaven: A Film about Ritual Sensation* (2010). His current project is the construction of an interactive, multi-media Singapore Historical GIS (SHGIS) and Singapore Biographical Database (SBDB) database shqis.nus.edu.sq and sbdb.nus.edu.sq.
