Short Biography

Sumit Mandal has been Visiting Associate Professor and Muhammad Alagil Chair in Arabia Asia Studies at ARI since July 2024. He is a transregional historian who researches the outcome of longstanding inter-cultural and inter-religious interaction in the Malay World—understood as a flexible and expansive cultural geography. His current research explores *keramat* (Muslim shrines) in the Indian Ocean as the built archives of a little-known past enmeshed in individual acts of intellectual and political leadership, inter-cultural interaction, transregional connections, piety, and miracles. This research has taken him to Java, Sumatra, Singapore, the Malay Peninsula, and the Cape Peninsula (South Africa).
